Artist Biographies

marion spencer (she/her/hers) is a Bessie Award-nominated interdisciplinary dance artist living in Lenapehoking/Brooklyn. Through a weaving of artistic mediums including movement, sound and installation, marion's choreographic works create poetic ecosystems within which to wonder, feel & dream, excavating the personal, the systemic, the unknown, the radical, the cellular and the beautiful. Her work has been presented in NYC by Roulette Intermedium, Center for Performance Research, Danspace Project, Gibney, New Dance Alliance, Movement Research at Judson Church, Triskelion Arts, Dance Now NYC, and more. She has been an Artist in Residence at The Chocolate Factory Theater, The Field Center, Gibney, Amherst College, Mana Contemporary and New Dance Alliance, among others. As a performer, marion has had the pleasure of dancing for Joanna Kotze, Laurie Berg, Kendra Portier, Laura Peterson, Larissa Velez-Jackson, Michelle Boulé, Tyler Rai and as a guest performer with David Dorfman Dance and Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane Dance Company, marion also teaches Pilates and is a Craniosacral Therapist. She is a graduate student at New York University's Tisch School of the Arts, earning her MFA in Dance: Interdisciplinary Research, to graduate May 2025. Stacy Lynn Smith is a neurodivergent, Black mixed-race performing artist and improviser, choreographer/director, filmmaker and Green Circle Keeper at Hidden Water, a restorative justice organization by and for those affected by childhood sexual abuse (CSA). Smith's practice synthesizes various lineages of improvisational forms, somatics, experimental theater and butoh alongside embodied trauma research. Shannon Yu 余香儒 is a Lenapehoking (Brooklyn, New York) based artist from Taiwan. Sha holds an MFA in Performance and Performance Studies from Pratt Institute and a Bachelor's Degree in Civil Engineering from National Taiwan University. Shannon identifies as a multi-disciplinary artist, dancer choreographer, and queer creator. Shannon is the founder and Artistic Director of multimedia dance company SHA Creative Outlet. shannonyu.smugmug.com EmmaGrace Skove-Epes is a Brooklyn-born and based artist, performer, and educator. Nadia Hannan (they/them) is a dancer, choreographer, arts administrator, and educator from New York City. Situated at the intersection of movement and text, their research is focused on the relationship between art, trauma, and the body. They graduated magna cum laude from Brown University with a BA in performance studies and hold an MFA in dance from Sarah Lawrence College. They are the current School Administrator at the Paul Taylor Dance Company and a creative collaborator with The Institute of Queer Ecology, This Body, and Dancing Legacy.

Alfonso Abraham Cervera and Irvin Manuel Gonzalez (elles) are artivists, community energizers, educators, and scholars. Currently, they serve as assistant professors in dance at Ohio State University, where they co-founded Fuerza e Flow, a Latinx/Latin American social dance research incubator. Their artistic collaboration lies at the intersections of cuirness, Latinidad, ritual, and activism, using dance as a medium to tell stories that highlight queer Mexicanidades. Their work explores the crafting, grooving, sweat, and potential that emerge from these lived experiences. Rooted in rascuachismo—a Chicanx, working-class, "low brow" form of creative resourcefulness—the duo dances between remembering and re-membering. They use Latin American social dance forms as tools to queer futurity, challenging the conventional uses of the body and the materials with which they work. Through their art, they incorporate spices, iconography, projections, and movement to build immersive worlds within spaces, reimagining cultural traditions to foster care, awareness, and social change. Cervera and Gonzalez have presented their work at venues such as HIGHWAYS, REDCAT (Los Angeles), El Teatro Campesino (San Jose), Judson Church (NYC), The Kennedy Center (DC), Dance Place (DC), and Dance Mission Theatre (SF). They are two of four co-founders of Primera Generación Dance Collective, a Latinx arts troupe that recently received a National Endowment for the Arts grant for the development of NOStalgia POP.
