#### **Artist Biographies**

Born and raised in Portland (OR), **Abbey McBride** is a white, cis-gender, queer performer and choreographer currently based in Brooklyn (NY). She holds a Bachelor of Science in Dance and Philosophy from the University of Oregon. After graduating, she continued her studies in Brussels (BE) at P.A.R.T.S. School for Contemporary Dance. She has worked as a freelance movement artist in Brooklyn (NY) since 2018. Currently she is examining the intersection of comedy and improvisational score building in her dance making. Abbey has presented work in and around NYC hosted by Triskelion Arts, The Center for Performance Research, Spoke the Hub, Movement Research, The Craft NYC, Green Space, The Field Center and Emerging Artists Theatre.

Mohammadreza (Momo) Akrami is an Iranian-Canadian dance and interdisciplinary artist whose work spans Toronto, Vancouver, Montreal, San Francisco, and Brussels. With a multifaceted background in mathematics, physics, and theater, Momo brings a unique perspective as a creator, dancer, and teacher. His diverse dance lineage encompasses Flying Low/Passing Through/Improvisation with David Zambrano, Butoh/Noguchi Taiso with Atsushi Takenouchi and Imre Thorman, and Grotowski/post-Grotowski theater. His physical practice is enriched by martial arts such as Wing Chun, Escrima, and Chi Kung. Momo has taught at various institutions including Simon Fraser University, Dance Arts Institute (formerly Toronto Dance Theatre) in Toronto, UC Berkeley, Studio 303 (Montreal), ODC (San Francisco), and BOE (San Francisco). His teaching philosophy integrates his dance lineage, personal practice, and life experiences, fostering an inclusive and exploratory learning environment. Momo's artistic practice explores the intersection of dance, image, and sound to shift perceptions of time and self. Grounded in his lived reality in Iran, his projects examine bodily autonomy and collective agency. Committed to guestioning artistic norms, Momo creates environments that foster exploration, driven by his fascination with epistemology, playfulness, and cultural appropriation. Belinda He is a Singapore-born, San Francisco-based dance artist of Chinese descent who received an MFA in Dance at Sarah Lawrence College under the directorship of Sara Rudner. She utilizes pedagogical and improvisational structures to support her creative processes, which often reflect her deep concern of the weaponization of "fake news" as propaganda, and desire to diversify ways of seeing as an antidote to the violence of erasure. Her physical practices of gigong and the Feldenkrais Method deeply influence her creative work, in the ways she relates to time, space, scale and self. She thrives in collaborative relationships, and enjoys current collaborations with Karla Quintero, Hope Mohr, Heidi Carlsen and Mohammadreza Akrami, which have recently taken her to artist residencies at SARUYA, Fujiyoshida, Japan (2024), The Old Mines, Outukumpu, Finland (2024), The Field Center, Vermont (2024) and Dance Nucleus, Singapore (2023). Belinda continues to be an active performer in the Bay Area and beyond, and considers the totality of all aspects of her life to be her artistic output. She acknowledges with gratitude influential teachers Sara Rudner, Barbara Forbes, Janet Panetta, Sandra Chinn and David Zambrano.

"Human Resources/HR Department" is a highly collaborative dance collective established by Halie Bahr, Jessica Boone, and Virginia Broyles. "Human Resources/HR Department" values fluid leadership and reimagining how dances can rub against systemic oppression. By contemplating the impacts of late-stage capitalism on bodies and dancemaking practices, we ask ourselves how imagination and choreography can question our current times and find a more livable way to make work today. Halie Bahr is an Assistant Professor of Dance at Southern Utah University. She researches the socio-political implications of trauma in the creative process, and has presented work and performed nationally in venues such as The Walker Art Center, Milwaukee Art Museum, 12 Minutes Max, and The Soap Factory. Texas-based artist Jessica Boone is a Lecturer of Dance at Texas A&M University and explores how choreographic processes can develop autonomy, intuition, and empowerment in performers. She performed professionally with Kathy Dunn Hamrick Dance Company and has presented work at Austin Dance Festival,

Barnstorm Dance, and more. Virginia Broyles is a film and dance maker currently based in Salt Lake City, UT. Her screendance work has been presented internationally and she's performed with Kathleen Hermesdorf, Simpson/Stulberg, Scott Wells, and BANDALOOP.
