A public sharing as a culmination of a Movement Research workshop with Daria Faïn SEED BOMBS are a series of starting points for my current ryzome project titled UPON HUMANS, which will unfold in multiple ways. A project inspired by the myth of Kassandra for The Commons Choir. An attempt to listen to the voices that we bury within ourselves and others. The Commons Choir's work evolves in unexpected ways due to its eclectic nature and non-traditional rehearsal approach, which enables the inclusion of diverse aesthetics and modalities. Individuals from diverse backgrounds come together to explore the intersection of Daria's practice, group dynamics, and personal expression through a public sharing. The work enables the revival of The Commons Choir, which had not had an open call for participants in eight years. As always with the choir, some of the material is from the past, some is from the direct encounter with each of the participants, and some is seeded to develop.

S/WEEPING is a duet exploring eroticism and servitude through a Filipino American lens. Featuring the walis (a woven Philippine broom) as an extension of the body, the object becomes a powerful talisman and conduit for energetic resilience.

Artist Biographies

Trishawna is a dancer, event organizer, and emerging choreographer from southwest Detroit. From an early age, she felt a divine connection to music and her body, which sparked a purpose in her as a movement artist. Trishawna is well versed in house dance, hip-hop, breaking, vogue, waacking, and contemporary dance styles. She explores this diversity of techniques through improvisation, letting her influences flow naturally, finding bridges between styles. Trishawna seeks to push the boundaries of dance culture through performances that respect and validate all forms.

Daria Fain is a New York choreographer and director originally from the Mediterranean. Her work fuses her European cultural background with three decades of practice in Asian philosophies of the body. American dance training, and theater. Fain has developed a unique movement and performance approach from this diverse background. She studied the classical Indian dance form Bharatha Natyam for five years in Paris with Amala Devi and in Madras, India, with Swarnamuckie (State dancer of Tamil Nadu, 1982). In India she also studied the co-relationship between this classical form of dance and temple architecture. Additionally, she was deeply influenced by her work with the Butoh-based artist Min Tanaka. She studied at the Graham School in NYC from 1984 to 1986 with a grant from the French Ministry of Culture. She has been an instructor of the Universal Healing Tao (Mantak Chia Chinese Taoist University) since 2001 and studied martial arts with Master Allen Frank from 2007-2010. Fain has extensively researched the reciprocal influence between architecture and human behavior and has given lectures on Swissborn architect and urbanist Le Corbusier. Fain has also studied theater in France with the Roy Hart Theater and the Peter Brook Company. She has conducted extensive research on ancient Greek Theater. Over the years, Fain's choreographic research has led her to work with people with mental illness, the developmentally disabled, and deafblind individuals, leading to a complex understanding of the body as an endless resource of knowledge. In 2006, working collaboratively with poet/architect Robert Kocik, Fain created the Prosodic Body, a new field of research on the embodiment of language that manifests in performance, education, architecture, and writing. In 2008, they founded the performing group The Commons Choir, a core and variable cast of roughly 30 singers, actors, composers, and people with whom they create highly socially charged performances. In 2017, they incorporated the Prosodic Body LLC, as an umbrella for all their activities. U.S. governmental Institutions and private foundations have funded Fain's work. She has performed and taught internationally in Mexico, France, Germany, Croatia, and the United Kingdom.

Kat Sotelo is a first-generation Filipino American performance artist, choreographer, and set designer whose practice blends movement, satire, and constructed environments. She explores the body as a site of commerce, using her experience in exotic dance to examine fantasy, cultural hybridity, and the labor of spectacle. By weaving video, personal archives, and Philippine folk traditions, she critiques the commodification of art and identity with kaleidoscopic visions. Sotelo is currently an Artist-in-Residence at Movement Research (2024-2026), Artist-in-Residence at CPR – Center for Performance Research (2025), and a Hybrid Arts Lab Fellow at Theater Mitu (2025). She lives and works in Brooklyn, NY.
