Researcher/Creator/Performer: Marielys Burgos Meléndez

Music: Lucid Girl by The Sacred Souls, Be my own boyfriend by Olivia Den *Are you flexible? Are you (a) flexible (worker)? On Desiring* is an artistic research exploring the materiality of desire, (self)eroticism, dance labor & BADASSERY. Through her approach of practice/performance-as-research, *Exposed Process*, Marielys asks questions about dance & artistic economies, precariousness, financial inequality, work flexibility, and displacement while experimenting with movement techniques and artistic practices archived in her body (*erotic dance*, performance art, Afro-Caribbean rhythms, eastern and western somatics, contemporary dance forms, and weightlifting, among others). Exposing embodied artistic inquiries and unfinished work Marielys makes (non)sense of all the dance ecosystems and geographies she transits and the relations she nurtures along the way. *On Desiring* is a parallel creative and artistic dialogue with her dissertation project.

Artist Biographies

Katherine Paola De La Cruz is a Dominican dancer and choreographer based in Queens, NY. She is a member of the Great Jones Repertory Theater Company at the La MaMa Experimental Theater Club and a 2025-26 Open Call artist at The Shed. Katherine has performed in works by Monica Bill Barnes & Company, The Soul Dance Company, maura nguyễn donohue, Valentina Baché Rodríguez, Catherine Galasso, Loco 7 Dance Puppet Theater Company, Zishan Ugurlu etc. She is a passionate choreographer, dancer and storyteller whose work center themes of social inequality, queerness, immigration and mental health. Her original choreographic works and movement improvisations have supported climate justice and immigrants' rights demonstrations in New York City. In her work, she interweaves narratives of nostalgia and hope that directly address sociopolitical issues and visibilize inner healing processes. Katherine aims to continue developing and deepening her own process while serving in any capacity towards the sharing of culture, memory and art.

Alexa West is a dance artist based in New York City. West holds a MFA from Bard College in Sculpture, and her work has been presented by SculptureCenter (2024) and the Performa Biennial (2023) among others. She was a Dance Research Fellow at the Jerome Robbins Dance Division of the New York Public Library. In addition, West is a co-founder of Pageant, an artist-run performance venue in Brooklyn.

Marielys Burgos Meléndez, MA (she/ella) is an dance/movement researcher, multidisciplinary artist, communicator, advocate, audio describer, and pole dance enthusiast in *vaivén* whose life thrives on social justice, decoloniality, and intersectional feminism. She is currently pursuing a PhD in Critical Dance Studies at UCR. Her research focuses on erotic dance as it intersects labor, embodied spiritualities, experimentation, mobility/displacement, and placemaking in the Turtle Island and her native Boriké. She has served as arts/dance administrator for over 15 years, is a 2023 Bessie's Award nominee for Outstanding Performance (Ensemble), and a 2023 Health Humanities and Disability Justice Fellow at UCR.
